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Why is there a 'b' in doubt? From TED

Ask questions to obtain the answers underlined in the following sentences taken from the text: e.g.

David likes bacon. What does David like? (Bacon)

<u>David</u> likes bacon. <u>Who</u> likes bacon? (David)

- 1) People often think the word *doubt* 's spelling is a little crazy **because of the letter "b"**.
- 2) But in spite of what most of us learn in school, **sound** is never the most important aspect of spelling an English word.
- 3) **A word's meaning and history** need to come first.
- 4) To doubt means to question, to waver, to hesitate.
- 5) And then it came into English in the 13th century.
- 6) About 100 years later, scribes who wrote English but also knew Latin, started to reinsert the "b" into the word's spelling,
- 7) There are **only two** base words in all of English that have the letters "d-o-u-b": ...
- 8) ...one is doubt, and the other is double.
- 9) We can build lots of other words on each of these bases, like **doubtful and doubtless, or doublet, and redouble, and doubloon.**
- 10) So the next time you are in doubt about why English spelling works the way it does, take a second look.
